## VDSS Division of Licensing Programs Receives Second Infection Prevention and Control Grant

**RICHMOND, VA. (November 1, 2022)** - The Virginia Department of Social Services (VDSS) <u>Division of Licensing</u> <u>Programs</u> (DOLP) was recently awarded \$1.35 million in grant funding by the Virginia Department of Health (VDH) to provide essential infection prevention and control support to licensed adult care facilities. In partnership with Health Quality Innovators (HQI), this funding will provide resources to adult care facilities and their staff to assist in mitigating the spread of COVID-19 and other infectious diseases.

Additional program outcomes of this funding will include:

- Technical assistance for licensed adult care facilities under VDSS to prevent transmission of SARS-CoV-2 and other infectious and communicable diseases and support clinical services during outbreaks;
- Support for assisted living facilities (ALFs) receiving auxiliary grant funding, ALFs providing care to underserved populations, and all adult day care centers (ADCCs);
- Training to licensed adult care facilities on educating family members and caregivers about infection control practices and vaccine safety, including the development of educational material.
- Training to licensing field staff on guiding facilities through a pandemic and infectious disease outbreak.

"Providing education and training pertaining to preventative measures and outbreak response is critical to assist our licensed providers in protecting the health of their staff and the residents they serve," said VDSS Division of Licensing Programs Director Tara Ragland. "We are committed to assisting our providers in supplying the tools necessary to help ensure the mitigation of infectious and communicable diseases. We are excited to continue our strong partnership with VDH."
